## Pond Leaves, Bacteria, and Cold Water...

Natural bacteria will do a great job breaking down the fallen leaves in your pond or lake – but only when water temperatures are above 50° F. Take your pond's temperature with a pond thermometer; as long as your water is at or above that 50° F mark, keep using microorganisms in products that will continue to work hard to break down organic debris.

#### Bacteria slows in winter (cold water)

There are some things you can do to keep your pond looking its best as the cooler weather approaches.

Rake Up the Leaves: As powerful as natural bacteria



are, they will still take a long time to break down fresh leaves that blow into your pond. Help those microorganisms out by raking up and disposing of as many leaves as possible.

<u>Rake Out the Leaves</u>: If they do float into your pond, use a rake to skim and rake leaves out of your pond. If an abundance of leaves remain in the pond, the leaves break down and will release toxic gases that edge out available oxygen – and that's bad news for your fish.

<u>Aerate All Winter</u>: Keep your aeration system running to circulate the water and keep your oxygen levels higher for better fish health and less sludge build up.

<u>Maintain Your Landscape</u>: In addition to raking up leaves around your pond, keep the foliage around your pond maintained. Prevent excess organic debris from getting into the pond and turn into algae and pond weed fertilizer. There's no way to fully prevent leaves from falling into your pond – but the fewer that do, the better

Koi have a multitude of traits that make them special. Their bright colors and unique patterns are a big part of the reason why Koi are so popular. Today there are numerous breeds of koi, each with their categories of color, pattern and scalation. Common terms are easy to learn for koi (see above) while patterns are more complex. Koi patterning are either continuous or in step configurations. A pattern that has no breaks or separations from head to tail is considered continuous. If the pattern has one or more separations that form several color patches, it is called a step pattern. Scalation is more challenging when not the basic pattering which is called "Wagoi" or the basic scalation patterning. Doitsu refers to Koi that are scaleless or mostly scaleless. Gin Rin refers to scales that are sparkly. Hikarimuji is a metallic scaled pattern. Kawi Goi is a leather type patterning. Kagami goi has a uniform and unbroken scale pattern running from head to tail.
